4. What the research says

The Sutton Trust research built upon the work of John Hattie and demonstrated clearly that different types of intervention had different levels of impact on pupil attainment and progress. The Sutton Trust Toolkit (https://educationendowmentfoundation.org.uk/toolkit/) shows that the most successful strategies in terms of improving learning gains are:

Effective Feedback

Feedback is information given to the learner and / or the teacher about the learner's performance relative to learning goals. It should sim to (and be capable of) producing improvement in students' learning. Feedback redirects or refocuses either the teacher's or the learner's actions to achieve a goal, by aligning effort and activity with an outcome. It can be about the learning activity itself, about the process of activity, about the student's management of their learning or self-regulation or (the least effective) about them as individuals. This feedback can be verbal, written, or can be given through tests or via digital technology. It can come from a teacher or someone taking a teaching role, or from peers.

Average impact +8 months

One to One Tuition

One to one tuition is where a teacher, teaching assistant or other adult gives a pupil intensive individual support. It may be undertaken outside of normal lessons as additional teaching, for example as part of extending school time or summer schools, or as a replacement for other lessons by withdrawing the pupil for extra teaching. Shirt, regular sessions (about 30 minutes, 3-5 times a week) over a set period of time (6-12 weeks0) appear to result in optimum impact. Evidence also suggests tuition should be additional to, but explicitly with, normal teaching, and that teachers should monitor progress to ensure tutoring is beneficial.

Reading Comprehension

Reading Comprehension approaches to improving reading focus on learners' understanding of the text. They teach a range of techniques that enable pupils to comprehend the meaning of what is written. These approaches appear to be particularly effective for older readers (aged 8 or above) who are not making expected progress.

Average Impact +5 months

Meta-Cognitive and Self-Regulation Strategies

Meta-cognition and self-regulation approaches (sometimes known as 'learning to learn' approaches) aim to help learners think about their own learning more explicitly. This is usually by teaching pupils specific strategies to set goals, and monitor and evaluate their own academic development. Self-regulation means managing one's own motivation towards learning. The intention is often to give pupils a repertoire of strategies to choose from during learning activities.

Behaviour Intervention

Seek to improve attainment by reducing challenging behaviour.
